Verses 1, 3 and the Refrain of this arrangement align with the traditional. Verse 2 is somewhat of a variation of that melody and harmony and more pensive than march-like. If you prefer the conventional arrangement, simply repeat Verse 1 and omit my variation (Verse 2).

Written as a processional for school children in the latter 1800's, this hymn was later adopted by the Salvation Army as their processional, chosen by Winston Churchill in 1941 for a church service aboard the HMS Prince of Wales (after agreeing to the Atlantic Charter), sung during the civil rights movement, banned by some denominations from their hymnals for its military tone.

As a well-known hymn, I felt it belonged in my *Hymns of Comfort Collection*, conceived during the Coronavirus Pandemic. Presently, the "*Hymns of Comfort Collection*" includes:

God Save Our Native Land (with "My Country, 'Tis of Thee")
Jesus Paid It All (with "Amazing Grace")
